

remaining staff and clergy have all risen to the moment and demonstrated what makes St. Luke's such a strong and unique parish.

In a church founded in 1864, clergy come and go. Staff will always have some level of turn over. But, throughout the generations, St. Luke's always moves forward as a community of worship and mission. For generations, St. Luke's has offered meaningful worship and opportunities for discipleship and fellowship, and demonstrated a commitment to serving our neighbors in Atlanta and around the world.





At the beginning of September, I was blessed to join you for this part of St. Luke's long story of faith and vitality. Since then, we have talked often and in many different settings about the reality that St. Luke's is well named. St. Luke was a physician, who became a follower of Jesus, and wrote a Gospel. Through his particular lens, Luke saw that everything Jesus did and said was in service to the whole person and the whole world. The founding rector of St. Luke's was a physician who became a priest, and this seems to have influenced the naming of our parish. For generations, St. Luke's Episcopal Church has been a congregation of worship with ministries and support for the whole person and the whole world. It is easy to think of countless ways that St. Luke's lives into the vision of our namesake still today.

The last few months working as partners in ministry, the wardens, vestry, staff, and clergy have added support staff and additional clergy and lay support for pastoral care. Even now the lay leaders, clergy, and staff are working on staffing and structures that will lead and sustain St. Luke's during the tenure of a new rector. All of this has been done while continuing to offer the full parish experience of St. Luke's with worship, special music events, Christian formation offerings for all ages, and opportunities to serve one another and our neighbors. It is a testimony to all the people of St. Luke's (lay members, staff, and clergy) that even with an unexpectedly reduced staff the full life and ministry of St. Luke's continues to move forward. The people of St. Luke's are committed to God, to one another, and to serving God's world. This is what makes St. Luke's - St. Luke's!

Usually parishes in rector transitions experience at least a 10% decrease in worship attendance and financial giving. Amazingly, St. Luke's attendance and giving have remained strong. Participation in all types of Christian formation programs, offerings of worship and music, and ministries for social justice, advocacy, and outreach have all continued to move forward. Day in and day out, the people of St. Luke's are demonstrating a true commitment to being a community for the whole person and the whole world. This is who St. Luke's has been for many years. This is who St. Luke's is now. This is who St. Luke's will be for generations to come!

## FROM THE WARDENS

Dear St. Luke's Family,

To paraphrase a famous jazz torch song, what a difference a year makes!

At the time of last year's annual meeting, we could not have anticipated all the challenges and opportunities in store for St. Luke's, our city, and our nation.

In the spring our beloved Rector, Winnie Varghese, was called to serve as Dean of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City. While we were excited for her opportunity to advance her ministry and share her wisdom

on a larger stage and also honored that our Rector was chosen for such an important role, we were saddened to lose her so soon.

The Rev. Joe Rose and Rev. Matt Babcock also left for other callings. Several of our key staff members departed due to career changes and family relocation decisions.

Abrupt federal budget and personnel cuts and policy changes adversely affected some of our parishioners and their families as well as the Atlanta community. Reversals in federal funding for nutrition, child care, and housing assistance presented major challenges for our community ministries and the neighbors



they serve. The construction timeline for the Stitch, the Interstate capping park planned for just outside our door, was jeopardized due to withdrawal of grant funding.

Our catechism reminds us that the ministry of the laity is to represent Christ and the Church “and, according to the gifts given them... to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church.” Being St. Luke’s, we applied our many talents and gifts and got to work.

And what amazing work we have done!

- We joined together as a church family to celebrate Winnie and our other clergy and staff and bid them a fond farewell.
- Your Vestry quickly pivoted to organize searches for an interim rector and key staff and to appoint a Rector Search Committee to commence the important process of identifying candidates for rector.
- We gathered in groups both formal and informal to support and pray for one another and our church during this transition period.
- We welcomed The Rev. Michael White as our Interim Rector. His wise counsel, gentle good humor, and enthusiastic preaching and teaching have been a comfort and inspiration. His description of St. Luke’s as being “for the whole church and the whole world” has become our touchstone.
- The Rev. Megan Swett and The Rev. Kim Jordan have been our clergy superheroes, somehow carrying out not only their assigned roles but also picking up essential tasks such as planning our parish-wide Kanuga weekend, supporting stewardship, and organizing the bulletin and liturgy.
- Music Director Matthew Brown organized and oversaw another year of exciting musical offerings, including premiering several new choral works and staging the 50th anniversary of our beloved Messiah Sing Along.
- The Adult Choir, Schola, and Choristers inspired and delighted us with their many and varied performances.
- The Rev. Brian Jemmott, recently retired as Canon to the Ordinary in the Diocese of New Jersey, joined our clergy team as Interim Associate Rector for Pastoral Care. His experience and wisdom – and his voice! – provide a valued addition to our clergy team.
- We were delighted to add talented new staff members in the roles of Clergy Administrator, Liturgy Assistant, Accounting Manager, and Sexton. We are continuing to evaluate and evolve our facilities management staffing.
- The Stewardship Committee, led by Ann Cramer and Mark

Simmons, who came out of retirement to assist, has conducted a spirit-filled campaign. Our Parish has responded with faithfulness and generosity.

- Our capable clergy, staff, and lay volunteers collaborated to sustain and enhance formation programming and activities for children and youth and support for families.
- The faithful work of the worship guilds made our services welcoming, beautiful, and meaningful.
- Our committees and outreach ministries continued their important work.
- Parishioners responded to the funding crises by providing much-needed support to Crossroads, the Atlanta Community Food Bank, Midtown Assistance Center, and other key organizations.
- The Vestry launched a Vestry Newsletter and Vestry Hub on the website and will continue to enhance communications with the parish as the rector search proceeds. Our Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Rob Wright, Canon Alicia Shuster Weltner, and Diocesan staff are providing invaluable support and guidance during this process.

Like the jazz song concludes, there is a rainbow before us. Exciting developments are underway. Our Backyard and Crossroads Dignity projects, begun this summer, will enhance our property with an improved entrance to Crossroads and fun new places for our parish to gather outdoors. Downtown Atlanta is experiencing a once-in-a-generation level of public and private investment in new housing, hotels, shops, and entertainment venues and improved streets and sidewalks. The world will be at St. Luke's doorstep this summer as the city hosts eight FIFA World Cup matches. We are retooling our organizational structure and staff to ensure stable management of the church's facilities and operations to prepare us for our next rector. The Rector Search Committee is finalizing the parish profile so that we can formally open our search.

Let us enter this new year with passion, purpose, and commitment to our church, to our mission, and to one another. Let us heed Rev. Jordan's advice to "Choose hope. Practice hope." Let us continue to our vocation for the whole person and the whole world.

## PARISH LIFE

### THANKSGIVING MEAL

St. Luke's and Crossroads teamed up again to serve our neighbors who might otherwise not have had a Thanksgiving meal.

Parishioners set up, cooked, and served a traditional meal and greeted about 175 guests. The gathering in Budd Hall included a table Eucharist service with music. Crossroads was able to assist individuals and families with housing, employment, clothing and documentation as a direct result of the meal.

### INQUIRER'S CLASS

St. Luke's offered an Inquirer's Class attended by 20 people, inviting new members to consider baptism, confirmation and joining St. Luke's. We were pleased to take a large group to the Diocesan Confirmation service at the Cathedral, where 7 people were confirmed and 7 received.



## BLUE CHRISTMAS

St. Luke's held a well-attended Blue Christmas evening worship service in December that recognized that sometimes the holidays bring sadness, disappointment, loneliness, and grief. The service provided a space of quiet holiness, a time of prayer and meditation, and a reminder that we're not alone. The evening liturgy featured prayers, music by soloists, and space for both quiet contemplation and conversation.



## KANUGA


The Kanuga Conference Center welcomed St. Luke's for our annual parish retreat. This year we celebrated our 50th year of Kanuga retreats. More than 240 attended the retreat, where our theme was "Bloom Where you are Planted" and Jeff Chu was our speaker.

## DRAGON CON & PRIDE PARADE

As a result of our location on a historically significant part of Peachtree Street, we were able to offer hospitality to people participating in two of Atlanta's largest parades, including handing out more than 2,000 bottles of water at the Pride Parade. We also offered hospitality at the annual Dragon Con parade, which attracts 100,000 people from across the country.

# PASTORAL CARE

September 11, 2025, I assumed the office of Interim Part-time Associate for Pastoral Care. For the remainder of 2025, I made several visits to parishioners, either in hospital, at home, or long term care facility, to pray, sit with, or administer the sacrament of Holy Communion. I have also made numerous phone calls to offer prayer and support while persons have been recuperating from illness, medical procedures, or needed to speak with a clergy member about a personal matter. Additionally, I planned and officiated two weddings, and three funerals. As pastoral care associate, I also sat in on meetings of the Intercessors Group, as well as the Community of Hope Team. Both of these vital St. Luke's pastoral care ministries pray for and visit with parishioners who are on long term prayers concerns, as part of a comprehensive approach to caring for one another in the parish.



Throughout 2025, Music at St. Luke's was honored to host several special guest artists, premiere new compositions, and participate in interfaith endeavors which enriched our partnerships with other faith communities in Atlanta. Music at St. Luke's also continued its ongoing partnership with ensemble vim as Ensemble-in-Residence. Founded in 2019, ensemble vim is a contemporary chamber music collective dedicated to the performance of music by living, underrepresented artists and composers, especially those with strong ties to the American south. The Choirs of St. Luke's are the heartbeat of this ministry. I give thanks for the ongoing support of the St. Luke's Vestry, the Friends of Music, and our Interim Rector. 2026 will bring forth many exciting events, most notably St. Luke's hosting the Opening Eucharist for the 60th Annual Conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians in June.

### JANUARY

- Ezechiel Daos, our 2024-2025 Gerre Hancock Intern in Church Music, performed an organ recital at Saint Thomas Church Fifth Avenue in New York City.
- St. Luke's hosted Walden Moore, recently retired Director of Music from Trinity Church on the Green in New Haven, CT for a pre-evensong organ recital.



### FEBRUARY

- Music at St. Luke's presented An Evening of Percussion featuring Michael Gordon's Timber, a unique 60-minute work scored for six wooden 2x4s, each cut into different sizes.
- Director of Music, Matthew Michael Brown, performed a pre-evensong organ recital due to the illness of a guest artist.
- Parishioners of St. Luke's and Ebenezer Baptist Church attended a performance of the Mississippi Mass Choir together at Peachtree Road United Methodist Church.

## MARCH

- Music at St. Luke's hosted Stephen Gourley, Director of Music at The Village Chapel in Pinehurst, NC for a pre-evensong organ recital.
- Music at St. Luke's welcomed the return of The Concordia Choir from Moorhead, MN for a concert.
- St. Luke's continued its engagement of The Mosaic Quartet as Quartet-in-Residence for several services and concerts throughout the year.
- St. Luke's hosted the Taylor National Organ Playing Competition on Saturday, March 22. The competition welcomed five talented organists to compete for a \$10,000 cash prize made possible through the generosity of the late Elizabeth Abbott Taylor, a St. Luke's parishioner and avid supporter of aspiring young Atlanta musicians. The competition was adjudicated by a panel of internationally acclaimed concert organists and teachers.

## APRIL

- Director of Music Matthew Michael Brown performed a pre-evensong organ recital on Palm Sunday. The St. Luke's Schola offered Evensong with music by Gibbons, Smith, Walton, and Leighton.
- The Choirs of St. Luke's offered beautiful music throughout the season of Lent through the Triduum.



## MAY

- Our 5th annual Concert for a Cause benefitted Returning Her Home, an organization dedicated to empowering and supporting women in their journey of reintegration into society following incarceration. The concert featured The Merian Ensemble, an ensemble featuring five of the women principal players of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.
- St. Luke's hosted a performance by OurSong Atlanta of "Sincerely Yours, Pauli Murray" an American Cantata commissioned by GALA Choruses. Rosita Stevens-Holsey, Pauli Murray's niece, was in attendance for this special performance.
- St. Luke's Choristers were honored for their choir commitment during the annual Chorister Recognition Ceremony. St. Luke's offers three choirs for children and youth: Preparatory Choir, Junior Choristers, and Senior Choristers.
- Junior and Senior Choristers enjoyed a trip to Boston, MA during which time they sang with the Choristers at Trinity Church Copley Square on Sunday, May 25. The excursion gave our Choristers the opportunity to collaborate with another successful and respected Episcopal music program and

experience the rich history of this iconic American city.

- The Adult Choir premiered a new set of Preces and Responses composed by Marty Wheeler Burnett, Professor of Church Music at Virginia Theological Seminary. The commission honored Colleen Kingston's 25 years of service to St. Luke's.

## JUNE

- St. Luke's hosted the second concert in a new chamber music festival called "Classical Remix Music Festival." Founded last year by Alice Hong of the Atlanta Symphony, this concert featured an octet of cellos performing music of Gustav Mahler, Edith Piaf, and Queen. This exciting new endeavor welcomed an entirely new and diverse audience to St. Luke's! Plans are underway for St. Luke's to host another performance in June 2026.

The Adult Choir enjoyed a break throughout the summer. Appreciation is expressed to everyone who sang with the St. Luke's Summer Choir.

## JULY

- St. Luke's partnered with All Saints' Episcopal, The Cathedral of Christ the King, The Cathedral of St. Philip, and Peachtree Road United Methodist Church to host the 2025 Atlanta Summer Organ Festival. St. Luke's hosted renowned Korean organist, Yoonmi Lim, organist at Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas, TX.

## AUGUST

- Following a summer hiatus, the Adult Choir and Schola resumed regular rehearsals for the new program year.

## SEPTEMBER

- St. Luke's welcomed Jonathan Easter as part-time Associate Organist. A graduate of Shorter College and Emory University, Jonathan accompanies the Atlanta Master Chorale and is a frequent collaborator with artists and ensembles in Atlanta.



## OCTOBER

- On Pride Sunday, the Adult Choir presented the southeastern consortium premiere of "Our Wildest Imagining" composed by Dominick DiOrio in honor of The Rt. Rev. Gene Robinson. Bishop Robinson preached that morning and participated in the Atlanta Pride Parade festivities following the service.
- Music at St. Luke's hosted Daniel Carroll, a student at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, for a pre-evensong

recital on the Feast of St. Luke (observed). Carroll is the First-Prize winner of the 2025 Taylor National Organ Playing Competition. His appearance was made possible through the generosity of the Atlanta Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

## NOVEMBER

- The Adult Choir participated in a concert commemorating Kristallnacht (Night of Broken Glass) at The Temple. This performance brought together choirs from Atlanta, Chicago, and Toronto. St. Luke's was honored to participate in this interfaith opportunity and renew our longstanding support of The Temple.

- St. Luke's hosted the 4th Annual Chorister Festival under the musical direction of Brandon Straub, Director of Music at St. Paul's Choir School, Harvard Square, in Cambridge, MA. Choristers representing parishes throughout the Diocese of Atlanta participated in a weekend of music education and local excursions, culminating in a service of Choral Evensong on Sunday afternoon.

## DECEMBER

- Our popular Lunchtime Live! series during Advent included performances by the Spelman College Jazz Ensemble, guitarist Luther Enloe, and organist Raymond Chenault. Each concert

welcomed many visitors to St. Luke's and included lunch from Henri's Bakery.

- This year, St. Luke's celebrated the 50th Annual Messiah Sing Along. Over 400 guests attended and joyfully continued this beautiful tradition. Under the baton of Maestro Clinton Smith, soloists included Grammy-nominated artists soprano Georgia Jarman and bass Sidney Outlaw, along with counter-tenor Cody Bowers and tenor Jonathan Blalock. The evening was made possible through the generosity of Friends of Music at St. Luke's.
- Advent Lessons and Carols included the premiere of "Lamplight" a new anthem composed by Grammy-nominated and internationally acclaimed composer, Nicholas White. This new anthem was commissioned in honor of The Very Rev. Winnie Varghese, 23rd Rector of St. Luke's and now Dean of The Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York. The anthem's text was written by St. Luke's parishioner, Kathy Lee.
- The year ended with all choirs offering their very best at all of St. Luke's beautiful Christmas Eve liturgies.

# COMMUNITY MINISTRIES

As a community of faith “for the heart of Atlanta”, St. Luke’s must address this prophetic question: “What does the Lord require of us?” As in the book of the prophet Micah, the answer regularly arrives in our congregation: “To do justice, love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God.” This is faith-in-action embodied at St. Luke’s through work for justice, ongoing acts of service, and advocacy for all God’s children.

## THE MUSTARD SEED GARDEN

Planted and maintained by St. Luke’s parishioners, the garden is located in the backyard at St. Luke’s. The garden consists of 12 beds with roughly 20 different types of vegetables that annually produce nearly 1,200 pounds of food for Clyde’s Kitchen.

## COURTLAND STREET MISSION

For more than 17 years, a dedicated group of St. Luke’s parishioners has cooked breakfast and taught Bible study to homeless men, women and children in the Crossroads kitchen on the fourth and fifth Saturday of each month. The average number of guests is 40.

## DIGNITY INSIDE & OUT

A ministry at St. Luke’s that partners with incarcerated persons and their families. Its mission is to empathetically and equitably live out the Gospel by empowering justice-impacted people.

This year, St. Luke’s is partnering with Motherhood Beyond Bars and Self-Help Credit Union in a program called Financial Futuring. The goal of Financial Futuring is to support moms returning from incarceration as they work to gain or regain financial stability. We’re looking for six compassionate volunteers to serve as Navigators—offering the kind of encouragement and steady presence that can make all the difference.

## FILL-THE-BASKETS

Fill the Baskets is a weekly collection offering during worship services that supports many of St. Luke’s partner ministries. Every Sunday parishioners bring food, toiletries, or life supplies and put them in baskets in the narthex or reception area. During the offertory procession, children and adults take the baskets down the aisle to the altar.



## FLICKERS

Each person has an interior spark. Flickers is an opportunity to collect ourselves and shine our interior lights together in community and be a part of doing something for community.

### “Labor with Dignity” Business-Casual Clothing Drive

Inspired by Francis Perkins, a saint of the Episcopal Church, to support human dignity and economic security, for people entering or reentering the workforce. Flickers collected, sorted, and steamed new or gently used workwear (e.g., business attire and scrubs) to be distributed through Crossroads and the Dignity Inside Out Financial Futuring programs.

## CUBA COMPANIONSHIP

The primary purpose of traveling to Cuba is to develop relationships with worshiping Episcopalians in other parts of the world. Since 2014, twenty St. Luke’s members and clergy have visited San Pablo Iglesia Episcopal Church in Camaguey, Cuba. In 2025, The Rev. Joe Rose and a small group visited Camaguey to meet the new Rector and offer support to the small parish.

## GRANTS COMMITTEE

Through the generosity of previous generations, St. Luke’s is the recipient of funds that are designated for improving the lives

## THE KNITTING MINISTRY

The Knitting Ministry meets monthly in the Library. Knitters of great skill or little skill, gather to knit for our undomiciled children and adult neighbors.

It is a year-round ministry. The annual ‘harvest’ of scarves and hats is gathered and blessed during Sunday morning Eucharist in the Fall. The knitwear will be distributed to those in need during the cold weather months.

## HOLY COMFORTER FRIENDSHIP CENTER DINNERS

Holy Comforter is an Episcopal Parish in Atlanta with a particular mission as an inclusive day program and community promoting mental, physical, and spiritual well-being of adults marginalized by mental health challenges and poverty. St. Luke’s ministry with Holy Comforter serves monthly meals, including a Thanksgiving Feast, to Holy Comforter at their Friendship Center.

of underserved people, particularly those with health problems and/or living in poverty. The Grants Committee recommends to the Vestry how those funds are used.

## PRIDE HOSPITALITY TEAM

In October, St. Luke's celebrated PRIDE by welcoming Bishop Gene Robinson to our pulpit and forum. We also welcomed thousands of marchers and parade-goers to our doorstep. A robust team of St. Luke's parishioners put on matching t-shirts, decorated the fences, served cold water to thirsty marchers, and provided comfort stations to those with need.

## THE ST. LUKE'S/EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH FELLOWSHIP-ACTION PARTNERSHIP

The partnership between St. Luke's Episcopal Church and Ebenezer Baptist Church, neighboring churches in the heart of Atlanta, represents diverse ecumenical Christian faiths. Our two churches join together for the purpose of building and implementing gospel-centered change and more loving, just, and humane ways and community for all. The partnership is committed to: grow and enhance our understanding of one another; cooperating and organizing our congregations and wider O4W neighborhoods for justice and healing; building bridges over religious, racial, cultural, and economic divides; and, modeling prophetic stances and engaging in action to unite on behalf of the poor and marginalized in Atlanta.

## HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

St. Luke's is part of the Habitat for Humanity circle of sponsors to build the first ever Pride House in Atlanta. Pride Builds bring together local members of the LGBTQ+ community, allies, and homeowners to work side-by-side on the build site. With this Pride Build, St. Luke's Community Ministries strives not only to celebrate LGBTQ+ homeowners, volunteers, and community members, but also to shed light on decades of systemic discrimination that have barred LGBTQ+ families and individuals from homeownership, creating biases and inequities that continue today.

# ST. LUKE'S COMMUNITY PARTNERS

## CHURCH OF THE COMMON GROUND

A worshiping community of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta. Church of the Common Ground is a “church without walls” on the streets of Atlanta, providing support for the pastoral and spiritual needs of women, men, and youth who live on the margins of our city. We welcome people of all faith backgrounds, and those who seek a new connection to faith.

## CROSSROADS COMMUNITY MINISTRIES

Crossroads was ‘born’ at St. Luke’s 51 years ago. It has grown into a social service ministry providing access to resources that empower people experiencing homelessness to progress on the road toward economic & personal stability. Construction on a new covered walkway and guest services annex began, which will provide safer, welcoming access to Crossroads’ mailroom, case management and housing support services. It will be finished in Spring 2026.

## THE ANSLEY SCHOOL

A tuition-free, private school for children who have experienced homelessness. The school was started on the ground floor of St. Luke’s in the fall of 2018, it is now in its own building nearby. Starting with kindergarten, the

school is growing to add a new grade each year, and enrollment includes an intensive family support program.

## RESPITE CARE ATLANTA

An interfaith respite program that offers top-notch care for persons suffering from dementia, which allows their caregivers critical and necessary time for themselves.

St. Luke’s hosted multiple respite days throughout the year.

## MIDTOWN ASSISTANCE CENTER

Midtown Assistance Center (MAC) is a non-profit agency created as a collaboration of metro-Atlanta congregations. Its mission is to provide emergency assistance to low-income, working Atlantans helping to prevent homelessness and hunger during periods of crisis. St. Luke’s has representation on its board, and our parishioners support the Center through the Fill-the-Baskets, and other food collections.

## FAITH ADVOCACY NETWORK FORUMS

St. Luke’s Faith Advocacy Network (FAN) convenes important conversations to form this community as advocates for God’s children who are vulnerable neighbors. FAN Forums are spaces of teaching and formation to equip the parish fight for the multiplication of the vision of the ‘beloved community’

in Atlanta, and in our state and nation. Examples of this year’s Fan Forums include:

- Preview of the 2025 legislative session;
- Economic Equity in the Old Fourth Ward;
- Absalom Jones presentation;
- Youth Conversation with the Rector;
- Hearing and Advocating for Incarcerated Mothers;
- Black History Month Evening Prayer Service;
- Dignity Sewing Centre Pop-up – partnership between our Diocese & the Diocese of Cape Coast, Ghana;
- Wear Orange Sunday to end Gun Violence. St. Luke’s is a member of the Georgia Majority for Gun Safety coalition, and this annual event is part of our collective effort to deepen public understanding and action;
- A Communal Conversation with Stacey Abrams on *Faith, Hope, Love, And Power*.

# FORMATION

At St. Luke's, we are people of faith who are lifelong learners. We take seriously St. Paul's encouragement to the early church at Rome to "be transformed by the renewing of [our] minds." This parish reads, thinks and reasons together in Sunday morning formation sessions, small groups, classes on theology and practical spirituality, topical Lent and Advent series, and Bible studies. Once a year, we engage in a church-wide book study of a recently published title or a currently relevant topic.

## SUNDAY MORNING ADULT FORUMS

Sunday Morning Adult Forums are a weekly opportunity for parishioners to gather and learn together. Sunday Morning Forums aim to equip participants for the living of these complex days, and for building up our individual and communal faith and strengthening the body of Christ. The Forums offer diverse learning opportunities in which all can grow in faith and knowledge. Meets weekly in Budd Hall.





### EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM)

This four-year program of study and reflection for lay Christian formation is structured by the University of the South's School of Theology and is taught at St. Luke's annually. The high commitment program helps participants encounter the breadth and depth of Christian tradition and practices, bringing them into conversation with experiences of the world in a faithful, small group community. For many, completing EfM has given them confidence to claim and express ministries in their workplaces, churches, and school and community. EfM meets weekly.



## SUMMER COURSE: THEOLOGY FOR TRANS ALLIES

EfM also offered a five-week study course on the theme ‘Theology for Trans Allies.’ The group explored the book *Beyond a Binary God* and met weekly.

## ANNUAL WOMEN’S MIDRASH

*Ebenezer Baptist Church Fellowship Hall*

As part of St. Luke’s ongoing Fellowship/Action Partnership with Ebenezer Baptist Church, all are invited to the annual Women’s Midrash event. The 2026 theme, drawn from the book of Esther, is “For Such a Time as This.” All are welcome to attend this annual gathering for study, reflection, and connection.

## WEEKDAY BIBLE STUDY

St. Luke’s hosts a weekly Bible Study on Thursday morning, offering lively discussions and warm fellowship. Recent topics have included the Lectionary and Current Readings; an in depth study of *The Acts of the Apostles* resourcing the book *Acts: the Gospel of the Spirit* by Justo Gonzalez; and, Reading the Bible from the Heart. Bible Study teachers are a rotating team of St. Luke’s clergy, convened by The Rev. Kimberleigh Jordan.

## SOUP AND SCRIPTURE - LENTEN SERIES

In Lent 2025, *Life Together* by Dietrich Bonhoeffer was the focus of our study and table fellowship.

# CHILDREN, YOUTH, & FAMILY MINISTRIES

## GROWING IN LOVE, RELATIONSHIP, AND SHARED LIFE

2025 was a year dedicated to nurturing St. Luke's thriving Children, Youth, and Family Ministries as a relational ecosystem of worship, formation, service, and care. Across all ages and offering, the aspiration was depth: cultivating trust, belonging, spiritual curiosity, and a lived experience of God's love through relationships with one another.

## BAPTISMS: BELONGING AND PROMISE

In 2025, St. Luke's welcomed more than a dozen infants and children into the household of God through baptism. Each baptism marked a communal promise: that this parish will share in the spiritual care, formation, and flourishing of these children and their families. Baptism continues to anchor our ministries in a theology of belonging, where children are received as full members of Christ's body, held by prayer, presence, and practice.

## NURSERY: TRUST, CARE, AND FIRST COMMUNITY

The St. Luke's Nursery remains a foundational ministry of trust and welcome for families with young children. Each week, caregivers offered consistent, loving presence to our youngest parishioners. For many families, the nursery is their first sustained experience of church as a place where their child is known, safe, and delighted in.

## CHILDREN'S CHAPEL: WORSHIP THAT FORMS THE HEART

Children's Chapel continues to be a central expression of how St. Luke's understands children's spiritual lives. Each Sunday, children gathered in Wilmer Chapel for dedicated worship time shaped by song, story, prayer, and wonder. Children's Chapel cultivates habits of prayer, compassion, and attentiveness – grounding children in their belovedness and helping them recognize God's presence in themselves and others.

## FORMATION: FAITH PRACTICED IN COMMUNITY

Sunday formation groups in 2025 emphasized faith as something that is caught more than taught. Through story, music, service, art, and conversation, children and youth explored Christian life as an embodied, relational practice. Lay leaders played a vital role, modeling

curiosity, care, and faithful engagement. Formation was not isolated to classrooms, but woven into worship, relationships, and shared service – reflecting St. Luke's conviction that faith grows best in community.

## **FAMILIES: FAITH AT HOME AND ACROSS SEASONS**

Recognizing families as primary contexts of formation, 2025 included efforts to resource households to practice faith in daily life. Seasonal resources – particularly during Advent and Lent – supported prayer, reflection, and conversation at home. These practices affirmed that faith formation is not confined to Sunday mornings, but unfolds across kitchen tables, bedtime rituals, and the rhythms of family life.

## **VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL: SHARED LEADERSHIP AND WIDER BELONGING**



This summer, St. Luke's partnered with neighboring parishes to offer a collaborative Vacation Bible School. Children, youth, and adults shared leadership in a week shaped by storytelling, creativity, and play. VBS also strengthened inter-parish relationships, empowered youth leaders, and modeled a generous, outward-facing approach to ministry.

## **FELLOWSHIP AND SERVICE: JOY, PLAY, AND SHARED PURPOSE**

Throughout the year, children, youth, and families gathered in moments of joy, celebration, and service. Seasonal traditions such as the Easter Egg Hunt, backpack blessings, Trunk or Treat, Advent Wreath-making, the Christmas Pageant, and the parish retreat at Kanuga provided touchstones of shared life and memory. These gatherings reinforced belonging and intergenerational connection, while service initiatives like Backpack Buddies and VBS outreach rooted our community's joy in compassion and responsibility to neighbors.

## **YOUTH: LEADERSHIP, BELONGING, AND COMMITMENT**

Youth ministry in 2025 was marked by leadership, and deepening commitment. Youth served visibly and meaningfully in worship, navigating responsibility and teamwork with growing confidence. Their authorship and performance of the Palm Sunday Passion Play reflected both theological engagement and communal trust. The launch of the 2025–26 Confirmation Cohort established flourishing relationships between youth and adult mentors, creating space for honest questions, shared exploration, and vocational discernment within the life of the parish.

# FINANCIAL ACTIVITY

The financial condition of our parish is strong. We are a thriving congregation of participants, worshipers and pledgers. The church and its work depend primarily on this continuous and growing support. It is the lifeblood that keeps St. Luke's moving. We continue to operate free of debt. Our giving is supplemented by income from generous endowments that were given by the generations that precede us. We are moving rapidly to complete important capital improvements to the Backyard and critical investments in the Hodgson Organ, funded by gifts made by all of you to our Prepare Ye the Way II Campaign. Finally, we meet to worship and live out our baptismal covenant in an extraordinary building in a location at the heart of a growing, vibrant city of Atlanta. How fortunate we all are!

Our 2025 budget was built upon a strong campaign of pledges for the year that was up almost 15% over pledges for the previous year. In the end our total income and expenses were consistent with the original budget. Graphics nearby show the breakdown of our sources of revenue and categories of expense.

2025 also saw accelerated progress toward completing our Backyard Improvement projects in conjunction with adjacent capital improvements by Crossroads Community Ministries, one of our campus ministries in the community. The table nearby lays out a summary of the status and activity of these projects and the Prepare Ye the Way II campaign from which they are funded.

Your vestry has approved a preliminary budget for 2026 with an expectation of similar contributed income to 2025, and a careful control of expenses. Those expense still remain to be reviewed in detail with all the staff. The preliminary budget is based upon our best projection of where the final tally of pledges for 2026 will end up.


